A few years ago I had a flight down to Haiti and back, which is what I normally do. As a DC-3 Captain I am flying passengers and cargo on Tuesdays or Thursdays back and forth.

At the end of the day, we taxied the airplane back to the Missionary Flights hangar, and then as pilots we began to clean up the interior. Typically we go through the cabin, make sure nothing is left, and everything is back as it's supposed to be. While doing this, I noticed that a wallet had been left on the airplane. Sure enough, it belonged to one of the missionaries that we had flown back to Florida from Haiti.

What I didn't have the opportunity to capture in this video was just how many missionaries I have the opportunity to work with in this way every single week.
